# Fate Rests In Buckeyes' Hands

## Purdue Going Wide Left Keeps OSU On Right Path

Ohio State may not be the latest version of the Kardiac Kids, but there is no doubt that the Buckeyes continue to specialize in heart-palpitating victories.

The latest came Nov. 15 before the second-largest Ohio Stadium crowd ever as OSU outlasted Big Ten rival Purdue, 16-13 in overtime.

With the win, the Buckeyes preserved a chance to defend their national championship in the Sugar Bowl and also put themselves on a collision course with archrival Michigan for the undisputed Big Ten championship. The Wolverines haven't had an outright conference title since 1997, and OSU hasn't enjoyed one since 1984.

"Quite frankly, I haven't heard much talk at all about the BCS standings or which bowl we might be going to," said OSU head coach Jim Tressel. "What I heard talked about in the locker room is that outright championship we haven't had since 1984. I think that's what our players seem to be focusing in on."

If recent history is any indicator, the 100th renewal of the rivalry known simply as "The Game" will likely be decided by a touchdown or less.

Beginning with Ohio State's 26-20 victory over the Wolverines in 2001 — a win that snapped a 3-12-1 string against their archrivals — it seems as though some kind of new rule has been written, mandating the Buckeyes play close

Including that 2001 win over. Michigan, 15 of OSU's last 27 games have been decided by seven points or less, and the team's record is a dazzling 13-2 in those contests.

"What can you say anymore?" said OSU cornerback Dustin Fox, who led the Buckeyes with 10 tackles and got just enough of a hand on Purdue kicker Ben Jones' 37-yard field-goal attempt in overtime to help it sail just left of the upright. "We've been in so many of these situations, we just don't panic. We have confidence that someone will step up and make a play, and that's usually what happens."


tory this season in a game in which they scored no offensive touchdowns.

They piled up 351 yards in total

offense against a stout Purdue defense that was allowing about 70 yards less than that on average but had to settle for a pair of Mike Nugent field goals in regulation and a defensive touchdown.

Although it gave up 355 total yards to the Boilermakers, the OSU defense did what it needed to do when it had to. It thwarted two of Purdue's three red-zone scoring opportunities, caused the only two turnovers in the game and shut the

### Boilers out in overtime.

"We did what we had to do," said defensive tackle Tim Anderson. "We had to stop them. Simple as that."

Most of the offense in the game for the Buckeyes was provided by Nugent, who booted field goals from 26 and 52 yards in regulation before nailing the game winner in OT from 36 yards out.

But there was no doubt that a principal weapon — both for the offense and the defense — was the brilliant punting of senior B.J. Sander.

Kicking 10 times in the game, Sander averaged 41.3 yards per punt. But more importantly, he dropped seven of those kicks inside Purdue's 20-yard line, forcing the Boilermakers to face a long field for much of the day. In fact, it was a Sander punt that he killed at the 5-yard line that led to the defensive score.

For his efforts in the game, Sander was named *Big Bear Buckeye of the Week*.

#### **Classic Heavyweight Bout**

For much of the game, Ohio State and Purdue fought like a pair of heavyweight contenders with one landing a hard punch before the other countered with a haymaker of his own.

The Boilermakers drew first blood with their first offensive possession, marching 53 yards in 12 plays. It was their most diverse drive of the game as they alternated passing and running the ball on each of their first 10 plays from scrimmage.

But when the Buckeyes stuffed tailback Jerod Void on two straight runs, Purdue had to settle for a 45-yard field goal from Jones for an early 3-0 lead.

Ohio State answered later in the first quarter, getting the biggest play of the afternoon when Michael Jenkins beat Purdue cornerback Jacques Reeves in single coverage and gathered in a 60yard pass from Craig Krenzel on a thirdand-8 play.

The pass was reminiscent of the Krenzel-to-Jenkins connection that produced the game-winning touchdown against the Bollermakers last season. But this time, the Buckeyes couldn't cash in. They pushed only, as far as the PU 5 before settling for a 26-yard field goal from Nugent.

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Purdue immediately answered, thanks to good field position provided by Void's 41-yard kickoff return to near midfield. But the Boilers couldn't do anything with their good field position either, and Jones' 47-yard field goal gave them a 6-3 lead.

The Buckeyes got excellent field position again near the end of the first half, using a short Purdue punt to set up shop at the PU 37-yard line. But after Krenzel scrambled for 17 yards on first down, the drive bogged down. In fact, it went backward from there thanks to two penalties, one for unsportsmanlike conduct on Krenzel, who argued with officials about what he considered to be a latte hit after he had handed the ball off.

"Apparently I said some stuff that I didn't think I said," the OSU quarterback said later.

Nevertheless, Nugent came on to fire through a 52-yard field goal, tying the score at 6. It marked the Ohio State kicker's third career attempt from 50 yards or more, and he's made them all.

### Down To Crunch Time

With the defense slowly gaining a foothold on Purdue's offense, and using Sander as a weapon, the Buckeyes played field position throughout much of the second half.

When the Boilermakers got their first possession of the fourth quarter, the score was still knotted at 6, but they were backed up at their own 5-yard line.

Three plays into the possession, Boilers QB Kyle Orton was finally corralled by the OSU defense. Will Smith and Anderson broke through and pressured the Purdue signal caller just enough that he lost control of the football. That's when backup defensive end Mike Kudla flashed into the scene and fell on the lose ball in the end zone, giving the Buckeyes their first lead of the day at 13-6.

With 6:48 remaining in the game, Orton marched his team 92 yards for the tying score. This time, there was no diversity — just Orton in the shotgun making plays for the Boilermakers.

He converted a big third-and-10 on the drive with a 12-yard pass to wideout. Anthony Chambers then found Void over the middle for a 28-yard gain on the next play.

Orton also scrambled for 18 yards on an important second-and-5 near midfield then later found backup receiver Kyle Ingraham for another 18 yards.

Then it was time for some innovation by Purdue head coach Joe Tiller. In what appeared to be a version of the old Statue of Liberty play, Orton faked a

pass before tucking the ball into Void's belly. The Boilermakers tailback took off around right end and raced into the end zone for the game-tying touchdown.

But the Buckeyes had a chance to win the game, thanks again to a defensive turnover. As Orton was trying to make something happen in the final two minutes, he fumbled again and OSU safety Donte Whitner came away with the loose ball on the Purdue 29-yard line.

Ohio State simply centered the ball for Nugent on the next three plays, giving him a chance to win it with a 41-yard field goal on the final play. But when the snap was low, Nugent's kick was lower than normal and Purdue backup linebacker Bobby Iwuchukwu jumped up to bat the ball down.

In overtime, both defenses continued to dominate. OSU gained only 6 yards in its possession before Nugent was summoned again. This time, he barely got his 36-yard attempt over Iwuchukwu, but it sailed through the uprights.

Likewise, Purdue managed only 6 yards on its possession. But Fox got enough of Jones' 37-yard attempt to help it sail just outside the posts, preserving the Buckeyes' victory and giving OSU's senior class a perfect 16-0 record at home the past two years.

It is the first time since 1983 and 1984 that Ohio State has posted back-to-back perfect records in the Horseshoe.

#### Game Notes

Nugent's three field goals against Purdue gave him 48 for his career. He is in third place all-time for the Buckeyes, just one behind Tim Williams (1990-93). Dan Stultz (1996-2000) is the career leader with 59.

With his 10 points in the game, Nugent also moved to within nine points of eighth place on Ohio State's all-time scoring list. Nugent now has 245 career points, just behind Josh Jackson (254, 1993-96).

• Jenkins' 60-yard reception was the third longest of his 151 career catches for the Buckeyes. He had 68- and 66-yarders against Penn State in 2001.

Those 151 receptions place him just three in back of Gary Williams (1979-82) for third place all-time for the Buckeyes.

But there is one record of Williams' that Jenkins cannot reach. Although he now has at least one reception in 37 straight games, Jenkins will run out of time before reaching Williams' school record of 48 consecutive games with at least one catch.

Ohio State outrushed Purdue 125-106 and is now 9-0 this season when outrushing its opponents.

The Buckeyes still have the No. 1 rated team in the country against the rush, averaging 50.5 yards per game. The rest of the top five, through games of Nov. 15, features LSU (60.8), Southern Cal (66.4), Oregon State (76.3) and Boise State (82.7).
