Bruce Didn't Take Long To Leave His Mark

Earle Bruce knew something was going to happen in 1979 — he just wasn't sure what it would be.

His first year as head coach of the Ohio State Buckeyes had immediate obstacles most notably that he was following one of the game's all-time legends, Woody Hayes.

Though Bruce was Ohio State through and through — he attempted to play for the Buckeyes before an injury curtailed his career and he served under Hayes as an assistant on the school's 1968 national championship team — it's not every day that you have to fill the shoes of the man many regard as the master of Ohio State football.

Surprisingly, Bruce seldom gave following Hayes a thought. He was more concerned with guiding the Buckeyes to the upper ochelon of the Big Ten, something the experts felt was nearly impossible. OSU went 7-4-1 in Hayes' last season and was tabbed fifth in a preseason media poll heading into 1979.

"That presented a challenge in itself because I've always thought of Ohio State being at the top of the Big Ten, not in the middle," said Bruce, who 20 years ago this fall guided OSU to an 11-1 mark and a Big Ten title in his debut season.

"We started out with what I thought was a fine football team. We had speed, good skill positions, a good quarterback in Art (Schlichter), good wide receivers and running backs, but our offensive line was inexperienced and small and not too talented.

But they were willing to work and they jelled as the season went on." The defense was truly ferocious, allowing

The defense was truly ferocious, allowing just 126 points in 12 games. Included in that total were six straight games with foes scoring seven points or less. Bruce figured his team would hang its

hat on the defense, at least until the young offensive line came together.

"Defensively we had good linebackers,"

said Bruce, now an OSU football analyst for Columbus' WTVN-AM. "We weren't overly big in the defensive line and probably a little inexperienced there. We had good speed. The kids were willing to hit you, boy. They loved to hit you. Our kicking game was solid."

And solid was all most people expected from Ohio State. But it was soon evident this was no ordinary Buckeye team. **Gaining Confidence**

OSU opened the season innocently enough with a nothing special 31-8 win over Syracuse. But peril came the next week at Minnesota, which was at the time much more than the pushover it's been of late. OSU trailed 17-7 at intermission and

looked to have no clue how to stop the Gophers' powerful double winged-T offense. So Bruce came up with a simple plan: Hold the ball and run the clock. It worked to per-fection as OSU secored two touchdowns in the second half to pull out a 21-17 win. Schlichter's 32-yard touchdown run provid-od the winger second ed the winning score.

A 45-29 win over Washington State fol-lowed, highlighted by tailback Cal Murray's 86-yard catch-and-run touchdown from Schlichter

Then came the second real confidence booster. OSU traveled to the Los Angeles Coliseum to play UCLA, and the Bruins looked to have the game secured, leading 13-10 with just under three minutes remaining. But Schlichter ran a masterful two-minute drill, finding Paul Campbell alone in the end

zone for a 2-yard score. The drive took just 95 seconds but it was enough to keep UCLA from coming back.

"We won some close games early in the season," Bruce said. "That helped get us together as much as anything, those two games. We really felt we might be on to something after those wins."

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

Former OSU linebacker Marcus Marek vividly remembers the action, because he was in the middle of it quite often. He was second on the team in tackles as a freshman with 106 and also picked off three passes. He remembers Bruce being upbeat about

the team, even though everyone was still finding his way

"He just told us to do the little things that meant the difference between winning and losing," Marek said. "He wouldn't allow us to play above our heads. There were certain things we could do and others we couldn't, and the coaching staff handled all of that very well.

The Minnesota and UCLA games were when we felt, as a team, that we could really do better than what people predicted for A sleepwalking 16-7 win over Northwestern followed, with freshman tight end Brad Dwelle scoring the only touchdown on a pass from Schlichter.

But then the Buckeyes really took off. In succession, they blasted Indiana 47-6. Wisconsin 59-0, Michigan State 42-0, Illinois 44-7 and Iowa 34-7.

That collection of blowout wins helped lift Ohio State, unranked in the preseason, all the way to No. 2 in the national polls headed into the regular-season finale at No.

13 Michigan. Marek's running mate at linebacker, Glen Cobb, felt OSU was as good as any team in the country at that juncture, and the Buckeyes played like it.

We were really confident by then and w just weren't going to let teams beat us," he said. "We weren't playing the strongest teams, but the good teams beat the teams

they're supposed to beat. We took care of business. We were preparing for Michigan because we knew we'd get their best shot."


With a Rose Bowl berth and undefeated regular season on the line, it turned out to be the Buckeyes who delivered the mortal blow to the Wolverines

"There we were, looking at our undefeated season going down the tubes, when ed season going down the tubes, when we had a chance to step up and make a play," said Laughlin, who had already blocked punts against Washington State and Indiana. "That's what college football is all about. I'm glad I had the chance to go out there and make such a big play."

The play, along with his stellar efforts all son from the linebacker spot, helped Laughlin edge out Schlichter as the team's most valuable player.

While Bruce was thrilled to beat Michigan in his first try, the block wasn't the chief thing that came to his mind about the contest

"Ohio State hadn't scored a touchdown against Michigan for three years," Bruce said. "That's what concerned me. Art threw one to Chuck Hunter, so we got that out of the way. We blocked a punt to beat Michigan, and it doesn't get much better than that."

Trojans Wilt The Roses

The 1980 Rose Bowl was one of the clas-sics of the series, with both teams featuring standout players. USC may have had one of its greatest collections of talent ever, with Ronnie Lott, Paul McDonald, Charles White, Marcus Allen and Anthony Munoz being just a handful of names who would later star in

"They had a great football team." Bruce said. "When you put it on paper I don't know how we kept it that close. We should have beaten them.

USC got on the board first with a field goal and extended the lead on a McDonald touchdown. OSU got on the board with a 35-yard field goal by Vlade Janakievski and a 53-yard

field goal by Vlade Janakievski and a 53-yard TD pass from Schlichter to Gary Williams. OSU went ahead 13-10 on another Janakievski field goal and increased the lead to six on his third field goal of the day. But USC would not be denied as McDonald led the Trojans 83 yards in eight plays. The all-important extra point gave USC a 17-16 lead and ultimately the win and, ultimately, the win. One crucial juncture in the game came

with Ohio State inside the USC 10 on fourthand-1. Bruce disdained the field goal for a running play but was stuffed. "That's one thing I would do over again,"

he said. "The way Janakievski was kicking, a field goal there wins us the game. They never could have driven for that last score to beat us.

Charles White was the hero of the day for USC, setting a since-broken Rose Bowl rushing record with 242 yards. USC's 519 yards was the

most allowed by the Buckeyes all season. The Buckeyes finished the year fourth in the nation, not the desired destination but a far cry from where they were expected to settle

"If we were two points better in the Rose Bowl, we would have been national champi-" Bruce lamented.

The 1979 team was the last Ohio State unit to finish the regular season unbeaten, but Bruce prefers to remember the strides made by the team rather than the season as a whole

"The offensive line made the greatest move from any unit we had," Bruce said. They did a good job. They helped make it all possible. We were a good team that practiced

hard, played hard and took coaching. They were determined. Ohio State is known for that. They don't just have kids who want to play football, they have kids who want to win.

"Our kids were tough. They may not have been the most talented football team around, but they sure as hell were tough and fast as anybody. They played with intensity.

The Aftermath

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Seventeen of the 24 starters from this team returned a year later, including nine on defense, as the Buckeyes went into 1980 as the nation's No. 1-ranked team.

But the pressure proved to be too much as UCLA blanked the Buckeyes 17-0 at home and OSU dropped games to Michigan (9-3) and Penn State (31-19 at the Fiesta Bowl) to end the year 9-3.

That was the first of six straight 9-3 seans for Bruce, who got pieces of three other Big Ten titles and a berth in one more Rose Bowl in 1985 during his nine-year stint as the head coach.
