Buckeyes Prepare For Rose Bowl Test With Arizona State

Its national championship hopes all but dashed after a regular season-ending loss to Michigan, the Ohio State football team is pressing ahead in preparation for its Jan. 1 Rose Bowl with

Arizona State.

That's good, because the No. 2-ranked Sun Devils (11-0) will be gunning for a the at national championship if they can secure a win over the Buckeyes (10-1).

"We're trying forget about Michigan and just practice hard for the Rose Bowl," said OSU junior tailback Pepe Pearson about the team's mood just weeks after the 13-9 loss to Michigan on Nov. 23.

Arizona State stormed through

the Pac-10 unbeaten, but stands one notch below ACC champion Florida State (11-0) in both major college foot-ball polls. The Seminoles will face No. 3 Florida (11-1) in the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 2 in a rematch of their Nov. 30 show-

ASU coach Bruce Snyder likes the way his team has come together, practically stifling its last four Pac-10 opponents in wrapping up the school's second-ever Rose Bowl berth.

Tve not seen anybody play better than us," Snyder said at a news conference for the Rose Bowl coaches. "There might be teams as talented or more talented, but this team is playing so well together, fits so well together.

I think we're playing well enough to be national champions.

Snyder and the Sun Devils have resigned themselves to the fact that if Florida State beats Florida again, the

> outcome of the Rose Bowl may be academic in selecting this season's national champion

"I think that who goes in (to their bowl) No. 1, and wins their bowl, should be No. 1," he said.

Different scenarios have played out in the past: In 1991, Orange Bowl champion Miami (Fla) topped the AP poll and Rose Bowl champion Washington headed the USA Today/CNN coaches poll. But two years ago, Nebraska won both polls with an Orange Bowl win, while unbeaten Penn State finished No. 2 after dusting Oregon in the Rose.

OSU coach John Cooper, who said he voted ASU No. 1, believes if the Sun Devils win, they deserve better than the fate Penn State got in 1994.

"If they win this game, they should at least share the national championship," Cooper said. "All you can do is win all your games."

Cooper, though, is in no way conced-

ing that outcome.

Rather, he still believes his fourthranked Buckeyes could squeeze through the back door to the championship with an impressive win over ASU and a

Florida win over FSU.
"I feel like if somebody knocks off Florida State and we're fortunate enough to win the (Rose Bowl) game, we should have a share of the national championship," Cooper said. "If that happens, there's not going to be any undefeated teams.

As the Buckeyes reconvened for practice Dec. 2, they were still shaking off the effects of their loss to Michigan. Yet, they feel they will have no problem getting up to play the Rose Bowl first appearance in the Granddaddy of

Em All since Jan. 1, 1985. "They probably do have more to play



Lot At Stake At Rose Bowl

If I have fielded one of these calls in the last three weeks, I've fielded 100 of them:

"What's the mood like there in Columbus?"
Well, out-of-towner, with each passing day,
the sting of Ohio State's season-ending loss to
Michigan has subsided and the community
seems to be looking forward to the Rose Bowl.

It has probably helped the healing process quite a bit that Florida lost to Florida State and Nebraska lost to Texas in the Big 12 title game. Those two losses, suffered by arguably the nation's two toughest teams all year, illustrate just how difficult it is to "run the table."

It is no sure bet that OSU would have moved into the top spot anyway after FSU knocked off Florida. Many voters would have elevated the Seminoles to the top spot.

It seems like a broken record, but every year in this December issue I write things like, "This program is at a crossroads," and, "This bowl game would be a chance to take things to a higher level."

I think both of those things are true again this year.

Even with a win over No. 2 Arizona State in the Rose Bowl, Ohio State probably does not have much of a chance at the national championship. After all, No. 1 Florida State will play No. 3 Florida in the Sugar Bowl. If FSU wins, they will probably win the national title, regardless of the Rose Bowl result.

If Florida returns the favor and beats FSU and the Buckeyes beat ASU, many voters will be inclined to put the Gators back at No. 1. Some will vote for OSU, but probably not enough to make the Buckeyes national champions.

Still, there is a lot to play for. Let me detail

 The OSU seniors can still go out as the winningest group in school history with a win.
 They stand on 40 victories now.

 A win in the Rose Bowl would be Ohio State's first since 1974. It would also be the school's sixth Rose Bowl win — an impressive feat whether unbeaten or not.

 And there is the matter of John Cooper's less-than-steliar OSU bowl record, 1-6. A win here would get a lot of people off Coop's back until next October, at least) and help legitimize his tenure at OSU. After all, his predecessor, Earle Bruce, never won a Rose Bowl in two tries, yet is held in high regard by many OSU fans.

As far as the game goes, I think this will shape up to be a great match-up between ASU quarterback Jake "The Snake" Plummer and his offense against OSUs stingy defense. Because of the gambling tendencies on both sides of the football, this match-up will be a treat.

ASU boasts nice yardage averages on defense, but if the Buckeyes can get back on track offensively they should be able to put some points on the scoreboard. Sure, the Sun Devils shut out Nebraska, but their season can be divided almost down the middle: They allowed 34 points in winning their first four Pac-10 games, but just 11 points a game in the stretch run as they began smelling the roses.

Which ASU defense will show up in Pasadena?

And the other thing is, regardless of which defense shows up, the current Sun Devils have never played in a bowl game. OSUs veteran team has played a bowl each of the last three seasons, and that should be an edge for the Buckeyes.

One more stat to ponder: Cooper is 1-0 in the Rose Bowl. As my prediction on page 19 illustrates, he remains perfect — at least in Pasadena.

More Random Thoughts

I can't believe Damon Moore wasn't named first-team All-Big Ten. He had a

great year from this vantage point.

Also, some All-American teams are missing Shawn Springs. As the Fabulous Sports Babe would say, "What's that all about?"

Keep an eye out for Orlando Pace to win the Chicago Tribune's coveted Silver Football as the Big Ten's most valuable player unless they go with hometown boy Darnell Autry of Northwestern.

Pace won't get the Heisman, though. Florida's Danny Wuerffel gets my vote. Consider: Alabama had allowed five touch-down passes all year until Wuerffel victimized the Tide for six in the SEC title game. Wow!

I got my ballot for Big Ten coach of the year and had to use process of elimination to pick my winner. Four of them — Jim Wacker, Jim Colletto (nice job landing with Notre Dame), Bill Mallory and Lou Tepper — lost their jobs. Four more had inexcusable losses — Northwestern's Gary Barnett to Wake Forest, Iōwa's Hayden Fry to Tulsa, Michigan's Lloyd Carr to Purdue and Wisconsin's Barry Alvarez to Northwestern.

That leaves Cooper, Penn State's Joe Paterno and Michigan State's Nick Saban. Coop got my vote for landing the Rose Bowl (at long last), followed by Paterno (nice regrouping effort) and Saban (good conference showing).

 Too much has been made of OSUs quarterback controversy. It makes me physically ill when I hear people accuse the coaches of racism in starting Joe Germaine against Michigan.

I lobbied in this forum in mid-November for Germaine to get the nod strictly and solely because he had surpassed Stanley Jackson in effectiveness. Somewhere since the Iowa game, Jackson lost his confidence — if not his patience with the platoen situation — and hasn't been the same. I hope he can get back in the groove and, when given the chance against ASU, produce again.

But for anyone to charge racism — which a university professor and a number of radio talk show callers have — is completely ludicrous. The change was made to give OSU the best chance to win the game and for no other reason.

Germaine earned the start. What's more, this is 1996 — nearly 2000. Why do people still harbor racist feelings? Get over it.

I know Jackson, for one, was embarrassed to be the focal point of this mess. He resents being called "a black quarterback." He's just a quarterback.

 Now that we've closed the racism case, we still have a slight QB controversy. Who will start the Rose Bowl?

As of press time, the OSU staff had not

committed to a starter. The smart money is probably on Germaine.

The darn thing is this quarterback uncertainty is going to rage at OSU for at least the next couple of years. Mark Garcia, back from knee surgery, is wowing people with his powerful arm in practice. Some insiders maintain he would have started if healthy. This spring, he'll join the fray.

In the fall, freshmen Austin Moherman and David Priestley figure to join the hunt, though they will almost certainly be redshirted.

 Speaking of 1997, our insiders have uncovered some possible position moves for next year.

With fullback still posing a problem and plenty of safeties and linebackers in the pipeline, there's a chance Mike Burden might move to fullback.

There are a lot of pluses to that scenario. Burden was a 1,000-yard rusher as a feature back in high school. Plus, he loves to hit. Looks like a great fit.

Burden can leave safety because Moore returns at the strong spot and Che Bryant looks like the heir apparent at free.

Mr. Versatile, Michael Wiley, could find a home at cornerback, where the Buckeyes will lose Ty Howard and probably Springs. Antoine Winfield and Gary Berry could also be in the mix as cover men, although Berry's position will be sorted out after spring experimentation.

Tackle Eric Gohlstin could be headed to center, where he filled in nicely early this year.

What's more, the Buckeyes are working on another good recruiting class. They figure to take six or seven versatile players in this class with, honestly, no preconceived notion of where they will play until they begin practicing.

 A lot has been made about Joe Hollis his play calling and his jump to Arkansas State.

If he leaves it looks like Walt Harris would be elevated to offensive coordinator. Short of finding a trad coaching job or an NFL spot like Lovie Smith did last year, Harris isn't going to make a lateral move to another college program. After all, why would he uproot and leave one of the nation's top five programs when things are going this good?

I hope, though, that tackles and tight ends coach Mike Jacobs also gets a look for the coordinator spot. Jacobs presided over two national title runs as coordinator at West Virginia.

Don't underestimate the amount of input he has had with the Buckeyes.

 Now, about the basketball schedule (and the fact few are attending these games) . . .

\$17.50 for Long Island U. is tough — as exhibited by the 4,000 empty seats on a Saturday night, although 11,153 was the "announced" crowd.

Hey, how about a common sense deal like tiered pricing \$10 for the Long Islands, \$15 for the George Masons and \$20 for the Indianas and Michigans?

for than as but we have something to play for ourselves," Pearson said want to win the Rose Bowl. That's what we're going to set out to do.

"I can guarantee you we're going to play hard. Hey, we've got things to play

QSU junior safety Damon Moore agreed the game presents a chance for the Buckeyes to spoil ASU's perfect season. But there's more to it than that, he

"I'm not going to state it by saying we're trying to ruin their (season)," he said. "We are trying to win the ball game and if that's what happens, that's what happens."

Cooper looked incredulously at questioners who were concerned about OSU's motivation.

"You guys have got to be out of your mind," Cooper said. "Why would you be concerned about getting up for the Rose

"If they're not ready to play in a Rose Bowl, they shouldn't be playing major college football. I mean, how many Rose Bowls do you get to play in, for goodness sake?"

For one, Cooper is excited to get back to Pasadena, where, ironically, he led Arizona State to a 22-15 triumph over Michigan in the 1987 Rose Bowl.

"It's the best bowl game I've ever been involved with," he said. "It's the biggest and most people say it's the best. Most people are envious of the Rose Bowl. It used to pay the most money, more people watch it on TV, it's in the

"I think it's probably the most prestigious bowl game you can play in.

About These Sun Devils

A quick perusal of the Arizona State media guide shows that the Sun Devils haven't enjoyed much postseason success in recent years.

Heck, they haven't even been to a bowl game in nine years.

But, in this instance, the ASU track record is ancient history. This Sun Devils team can play, Cooper said.

"They're a good football team," he said. "You don't go to the Rose Bowl unless you're a good team. They're probably the best team we've seen this year. I voted them No. 1.

In years past, ASU played the part of Pac-10 also-ran well. The Sun Devils would come close, but never close the deal.

That changed this year under Snyder, finishing his fifth year in Tempe. With quarterback Jake Plummer essentially willing ASU to victory, the Sun Devils survived tight scrapes with Washington, UCLA and USC in the conference and blanked defending national champion Nebraska to claim their position at - or near the top of the polls.

"They find ways to win," Cooper said.
"You watch the UCLA game and you wonder, 'How in the hell did they ever come back to win this game?' but they came back and won. That Southern Cal game goes into overtime. Plummer just finds ways to win.

Plummer, ASU's all-time leading passer, was a Heisman finalist this year. In his last 16 games as a starter, he has 31 touchdown passes against just 11

interceptions.

"The people on the West Coast tell me that he will have bad plays, but does not have bad games," Cooper said.

Plummer is confident Arizona State will sidestep the Buckeyes and claim at least a piece of the national

"We've got to go out and take care of Ohio State and do what we can to win that game." he said. "If it's left up to the poll people, regard-

less of how it comes out, I know going undefeated any time in college football with our schedule, we can say we're national champs even if we didn't get that vote.

"Really, I'm not that worried about that. We have to go out and win the game

He knows, however, he will have to

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contend with OSU's blitzing defense which finished second in the nation in scoring, allowing just 10.4 points per game.
"We saw that from a

few different teams, Plummer said of OSU's pressure defense. "If we're prepared and ready and our guys are reading them right and picking up the blitzes, we've been able to do pretty well against it. But when they bring

more than we can han-

dle, you have to get into the right play. "Ohio State's got a good defense. They bring them from everywhere. We like the challenge. It's going to be a lot of fun." he said.

Snyder is not comfortable lobbying for the No. 1 spot. He recognizes it's hard for an upstart contender like Arizona State to match poll votes with a perenni-

al powerhouse like Florida State.

We have not won consistently over a long period and we weren't going to start very high," he said, recalling that the Sun Devils began the year at No. 20 in the

Associated Press poll.
"We did beat Washington early, then Nebraska and that sent shock waves across the country. We knew we were going to jump some, although I'm sure a lot of people were still skeptics, thought that it was just a blip."

Winning the Rose Bowl but not the national championship would not be a source for depression, Snyder said.
"Heck no," he said. "I'm proud as I can

be being 11-0. And if we're fortunate enough to be 12-0, I know we're going to receive one vote, mine. And I'm going to be happy and I'm going to celebrate that

Michigan Malaise Lingers

Try as they might, the Buckeyes had lingering thoughts about what might have been if only they had beaten

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It could be OSU sitting in the top spot and with the inside track to the school's first national championship in 28 years if only it had beaten Michigan.

"It's hard to forget about them, but I really don't want to talk about the Michigan game," Pearson said.

When pressed further, Pearson revealed it's hard to escape the subject. Even going home for Thanksgiving provided little comfort.

"I'm not really down," he said, speaking in hushed tones. "It's just that you go home after The Game and you get asked questions every day, every day, every day. You just don't know what it's like untilyou're an athlete and you play for Ohio

"But you've just got to deal with it. Everybody was down, but you've got to get over it and concentrate on playing

your best game in the Rose Bowl."

Pearson said OSU would use the loss as an instructional tool as well as motivation to finish the season on a high note.

"By losing, we'll learn from what we need to do," he said. "Everybody wants to win, but sometimes a loss helps you get better as a team. Maybe that will help us with this game.

"The most important thing is to focus on Arizona State and try to win the Rose Bowl. I think if we can do that, we can look back and say this was a successful season."

Recent history has shown the Buckeyes haven't played well in bowl games, losing six of seven since Cooper arrived in 1988.

A year ago, OSU suffered a similarly deflating loss at Michigan and then sleepwalked its way to a loss to Tennessee in the Citrus Bowl.

The players vow, though, this year will be different.

"We're going to get better," Moore said. "We're not going to let the Michigan game affect us.

This isn't like last year - we're not going to let two or three people walk all over us. We're not going to end up with two losses in a row.

Moore agrees that Michigan essentially robbed OSU of its national championship dream, but there is still a lot worth playing for.

"I'd be lying if I said 'No, it didn't hurt," because that game did take away a lot, he said. "We probably would have been more excited, but don't get me wrong we are excited about the Rose Bowl.

"And we're not just excited about going there. We want to win it."

Arizona State Guns For Title

Sun Devils Bask In Rose Bowl Glow

Opportunities like the one Arizona State has on Jan. 1 in the Rose Bowl don't come along too often.

That's why ASU coach Bruce Snyder intends on savoring this experience

'It might truly be a once in a lifetime experience to go undefeated into a Jan. 1 bowl, ranked second and having an opportunity for No. 1," Snyder said as his Sun Devils (11-0) prepare to tackle fourth-rated Ohio State (10-1) in the

Prior to the season, Arizona State figured to contend with defending Rose Bowl champion USC for the Pac-10

But after the Sun Devils opened with a September To Remember, beating Washington and top-ranked Nebraska, ASU and quarterback Jake Plummer became household names.

"Going into this whole season, the important game was Washington game and getting that first victory," Plummer said of ASU's 45-42

season-opening victory.
"Then, we looked at that third game and Nebraska was No 1. It was a great opportunity for this program.

"With the way we played them down there last year (a 77-28 loss), we knew we could do some good things. Plus, with the improvement of our defense, we were able to do some real good things as far as shutting them down,"

ASU forced three Nebraska safeties, and with Plummer throwing for 292 yards and a touchdown, the Sun Devils shocked the two-time defending national champions 19-0.

As the win resonated across the country, it served to lift an ASU program seemingly stuck on 6-5, finishing with that mark four of the last five

"That gave us confidence, put us up to the top of the country (in the polls) and we were able to carry that momentum out," Plummer said.

ASU followed a bumpy, though thrilling, path to Pasadena - including one previous stop there. The Sun Devils rallied from 21 points down to defeat UCLA 42-34 in the Rose Bowl. A week later, ASU needed two overtimes to dispatch USC 48-35.

"We knew we were going to jump some, although I'm sure a lot of people were still skeptics, that it was just a blip," Snyder said as his team paraded through the Pac-10.

The Sun Devils clinched the confer-ence title with a 35-7 win over Cal and, just for good measure, went to Tucson and crushed archrival Arizona 56-14.

As previously unbeaten powers Florida and Ohio State dropped key games, Arizona State rose to No. 2 in the country behind unbeaten Florida

Snyder's happy to be there, but he's not necessarily content: He is bucking to be No 1.

"I've not seen anybody play better than us," he said. "There might be teams as talented or more talented, but this team is playing so well together, fits so well together.

"I think we're playing well enough to be national champions.

They Have Plummer And . .

Plummer, profiled on page 22 of this edition of BSB, is ASU's cocksure leader. He stands as the school's career passing leader and is among the top candidates for this year's Heisman Trophy.

Since Arizona State hasn't been a

major player on the national scene in recent years — this will be only the sec-ond Rose Bowl appearance by ASU and the school's first bowl of any kind in nine years - publicity is just now finding the Tempe campus and ASU players other than Plummer.

One of them, massive 319-pound left tackle Juan Roque, was a finalist for the Lombardi Award. Roque, a sure-fire All-American at tackle alongside Lombardi winner Orlando Pace of Ohio State, has truly come into his own.

"All other left tackles stand in Juan's

shadow," Snyder said.

Dynamic Keith Poole, a 6-2 senior, leads the receiving corps. He caught 46 passes for 857 yards and 11 TDs this season. He is a Biletnikoff Award candidate after nearly jumping to the NFL a year early.

Other than Plummer, Roque and Poole, though, ASU has kind of a no-

name group

"Even if there were not a Rose Bowl a national ranking or a Lombardi or a Heisman, but to go from where we were two years ago (3-8) and to jump like we did, I have a tremendous amount of pride for what these players have accomplished," Snyder said.

One of ASU's true up-and-comers is junior tailback Terry Battle. He began the year as the No. 3 tailback, but ended up as the Sun Devils' leading rusher with 1,043 yards and 18 touchdowns on 160 carries. He also returned a pair of kicks for scores this year.

Poole is complemented by sophomore Lenzie Jackson at the other receiver spot and senior Steve Bush at tight end.

Roque is one of three eniors on the offensive line. He is joined up front by classmates Kirk Robinson at center and 308-pounder Pat Thompson at right guard.

The clusive Plummer may cover for some of the line's deficiencies at times, though. ASU allowed nearly three sacks a game this year.

Defense Staunch Against Run

The Arizona State defense has the shutout of usually high-scoring Nebraska to hang its hat on. But it must be pointed out that the 'Huskers are heavily tilted to the run, and stopping that is ASU's forte.

The Sun Devils allowed opponents just 98 yards a game rushing.

The big name up front is junior defensive end Derrick Rodgers, a 6-2, 222-pounder who tallied 12 sacks and a whopping 23 tackles-for-loss this

While Rodgers may be a little light for a line spot, his line mates make up for it. He's flanked by 6-8, 278-pounder Brent Burnstein on the other end and Shawn Swayda (276 pounds) and Albrey Battle (285) at the tackle

Senior inside linebacker Scott Von der Ahe was a Butkus Award candidate - rightfully so - accumulating a teamhigh 106 tackles.

Junior linebacker Pat Tillman is a solid contributor with 91 stops and four interceptions.

Snyder: Hot Property

Snyder will be a serious contender for national coach of the year honors this year.

The 56-year-old Snyder is wrapping up his fifth season in Tempe after previous stints at Utah State and Cal. He bolted Cal after a 10-2 season in 1991 to replace the fired Larry Marmie at ASU

Having now reached the promised land with the Sun Devils, he has started to ponder his future - in Tempe.

"I don't have some optimum job some place other than right here." Snyder said. "It seems to me like everybody leaves the door open, so it seems that is my obligation, too.

"I need to do what's best for my fam-

ily and for me. Right now it is Arizona State and to get ready for the Rose Bowl and win that game.

"I guess if someone came to me who had enough authority and said, 'You will never be fired,' then I would say, Then I'll never quit.' But I don't know if anybody will say that.

"That is what I mean by keeping doors open. But right now I'm not looking for another job," he said.

Previous Meetings

Snyder and OSU coach John Cooper have only faced each other one other

Ironically, Cooper was in his final year at ASU in 1987 when his team traveled to Cal to face Snyder's Golden Bears. Cal prevailed 38-20.

Ohio State and Arizona State have only met one previous time on the grid-

That meeting came in 1980 when coach Earle Bruce's Buckeyes thumped Darryl Rogers' ASU team 38-21 in Ohio

OSU RUSH OFFENSE vs. ARIZONA STATE RUSH DEFENSE

it might seem like Ohio State is wedded to the run - even when it isn't working leading the league in rushing, that might not be a sound strategy against the Sun Devils, who allow 98 yards per contest on the ground, Derrick Rodgers is a hungry end and can play the pass and run equally well. He's sort of ASU's Mike Vrabel. Safety Damlen Richardson is decent in run support and the linebackers are stout, so the best plan of attack might be for Pepe Pearson to follow big No. 75 around end. EDGE: EVEN

ARIZONA STATE RUSH OFFENSE Vs. OSU RUSH DEFENSE

The Sun Devils are primarily a passing team, but that doesn't mean the Bucks can load up to stop Jake Plummer and his aerial assault. Terry Battle, who started the year as third-string tailback, has rambled his way up the depth chart and over opponents (1,043 yards and 18 TDs). Plummer isn't a bad runner, either, so OSU will have to keep containment. ASU's offensive line is good, paving the way for nearly 250 yards per game. Juan Roque, the largest lineman in the Pac-10, is nearly as good as Pace and center Kirk Robertson is solid. The Buckeyes need to close off Battle's running lanes, which are usually between guard and center. That puts the onus on Luke Fickell and Winfield Garnett. EDGE: OHIO STATE

OSU PASS OFFENSE vs. ARIZONA STATE PASS DEFENSE

ASU is usually easy pickings when teams decide to air it out, but against the Buckeyes the Devils might just be successful. OSU's throwing game has gone downhill since midseason, with predictable routes, quarterbacks locking onto one guy and missing open receivers. The pass blocking hasn't been bad, so all Stan Jackson and Joe Germaine need is a little confidence. ASU is led by safety Mitchell "Fright Night" Freedman, known for his teeth-rattling hits. When Rodgers lines up over Pace, it's a war worth watching. EDGE: EVEN

ARIZONA STATE PASS OFFENSE vs. OSU PASS DEFENSE

This will be where the game is won or lost. If the Buckeyes give I ummer as much time as they gave Brian Griese, it's curtains. Plummer can beat you by himself, but he doesn't have to with speedster Keith Poole and shifty Lenzie Jackson at his disposal. Tight end Steve Bush has soft hands and isn't afraid to block. ASU has allowed 32 sacks, but some of that is when Plummer leaves the pocket. If OSU gets to him early, there's a small chance he'll get rattled. The Mike Vrabel-against-Roque match-up could be the key to that scenario. More likely the Buckeyes will have to get a few picks to shake his confidence. Matched up with Poole, Shawn Springs might get that elusive pick he's been waiting all year for. EDGE: ARIZONA STATE

SPECIAL TEAMS

Battle has been dangerous as a kick returner, and J.R. Redmond is slippery bringing back punts. ASU has one of the nation's best return units, so OSU will have to stay in its lanes to avoid a big runback. Punter Lance Anderson has a big leg and has put 14 punts inside the 20. OSU likes to bring the house, but Anderson hasn't had one blocked yet. Kicker Robert Nycz has missed just four field goals, so if the Buckeyes don't block a kick, there isn't much chance of winning this fight EDGE: ARIZONA STATE

INTANGIBLES

This should be interesting: ASU has one eye on the national championship and the Buckeyes. traditional sad-sacks in the postseason, are playing for redemption. And they do it against the team that sent John Cooper to Columbus. There are still plenty of hurt feelings stemming from Michigan, but the Buckeyes need to put that in the past. Plummer might be the wild card here because he has the confidence to bring his team back from almost any deficit. There's no shortage of confidence on the ASU side. Ohio State hasn't been to Pasadena for 12 years, so there's a good shot at showing well. EDGE: ARIZONA STATE

Snake Good Nickname For Elusive Plummer

When you ask Arizona State quarterback Jake Plummer where his nickname "The Snake" comes from, the answer is pretty simple.

"I got it probably in the eighth grade when my brother started calling me the Snake," Plummer said. "He got me turned on to Kenny Stabler. His nickname was the Snake, and I read his book and remembered him from when I was really young. That's when it started.

"It rhymes with Jake and it's a good mckname."

Both the nickname and the comparison to the former Alabama and Oakland Raiders great Stabler are appropriate.

Plummer has guided Arizona State to a perfect 11-0 record almost on sheer will. If he has to complete a big pass, he does it. If he has to scramble to avoid a sack, he gets it done.

Heck, he even caught a 16-yard touchdown pass — a highlight reel-caliber play where he had to break several tackles that the Sun Devils desperately needed in their come-from-behind 42-34 win at UCLA.

"Any time you can be a guy who is considered a play-maker, that's a compliment," Plummer said "If I get happy feet

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or I want to get out of there, I have guys around me who are able to make me look good, whether it's Keith (Poole) coming back to the ball or somebody else."

The Plummer-to-Poole combination has been among ASU's most lethal weapons, combining for 19 touchdowns over the past two years.

Moreover, Plummer is ASUs all-time passing leader with 8,626 yards. He is tied with Danny White for the ASU career lead in touchdowns with 64, a mark he could set on his own in the Rose Bowl with a TD pass against Ohio State.

"There is not a single player in college football who means more to his team than Jake Plummer," ASU coach Bruce Snyder said of his Heisman Trophy and Davey O'Brien Award candidate.

"We all should just be enjoying this guy, not just at Arizona State but everybody in college football should be He's a beck of a football player. His team loves him. He loves his team. He's what it's all about," the coach said.

ASU's starter since midway through his freshman year in 1993. Plummer really began to find his stride toward the end of last season. He helped ASU to late-season wins over ranked powers Oregon and UCLA, games that served as building blocks for this year's Pac-10 championship season.

In fact, over his last 16 games including the final five of last year — Plummer has 31 touchdowns against just 11 interceptions.

Yet his style could be described best as freewheeling. Like a snake, he is hard to pin down behind the line of scrimmage.

"He's sick and crazy," Poole said of his quarterback. "I told him to quit running around back there and throw the ball."

Plummer looks at things differently, to say the least.

"I pride myself on having the ability to make something out of nothing," he said. "It's gotten us out of some situations when things weren't looking that good."

One of Plummer's best assets, many

say, is his ability to put the bad plays behind him. That, in fact, is a trademark of Snyder's coaching style.

"I've had four different (position) coaches in four years and I've learned a lot from them," Pluminer said. "The main thing I learned was to let things go. If you throw an interception or make a bad play, you have to let it go.

"That also comes from Coach Snyder's philosophy of 'One At A Time.' That comes down to one game at a time, one quarter at a time and even one play at a time. I can't let one play hinder my performance because the team relies on me to be the cool-headed guy in the huddle."

Plummer was among the four finalists invited to New York City for the Heisman Trophy presentation Dec. 14. The acclaim is nice for this Boise, Idaho, native.

"I'm enjoying it, but it's a credit to my

teammates," he said.
"If I didn't have the
guys surrounding me
allowing us to win
games, I wouldn't be in
this position. I've had a
couple had games, but
we were able to pull
through with the help
of our running backs
and our defense.

"It's my team that's keeping me in it. I'm surprised to be there."

An Outspoken Man

An exciting player on the field, Plummer also has a lot to say off of it. Here are some opinions he shared recently.

 Plummer aired out ESPN college football analyst Lee Corso, slow to buy into Arizona State's legitimacy. He picked the Sun Devils to fail at various points in their Pac-10 run.

"He does his job and he doesn't do a very good job at it," Plummer said of Corso. "I'm going to be really mad if he picks us to beat Ohio State because he hasn't picked us all year and we've turned around and made him look like a real idiot.

"Hopefully, he'll pick Ohio State so we can do it again to him."

 On an Associated Press poll voter from Norman, Okla., who was giving Nebraska a first-place vote despite ASU's unbeaten mark and head-to-head win, he said, "There's another idiot out there. I guess."

 When asked about OSU couch John Cooper's 1-6 bowl record with the Buckeyes, he replied, "A few of the guys on the team who are big sports fans may know about that. I know about it through my brothers and just from watching
